## QUESTIONS AND ANSWERS

The following question has been submitting concerning RFP \#231802 - Fresh Produce for Direct Delivery to School Cafeterias. The question received has been answered and are stated verbatim from what was received:

QUESTION \#1: I was on your website and I found your Fresh Produce bid\# 231802. Can you tell me if there is a previous contract tab or award available to review?

Answer: Yes, it can be found at https://ecsd-fl.schoolloop.com/purchasing/bids previously. It is under RFP \#162102.

QUESTION \#2: Is there an estimated annual spend on this requirement?
Answer: The estimated annual spend may vary with purchased items. For the 2022-2023 school year, the estimated annual spend is $\mathbf{\$ 4 5 0 , 0 0 0}$.

QUESTION \#3: Item 10 - Cantaloupe says quantity 100 and unit as lb . Should the unit be case as the description states 12 count per case?

Answer: Yes, the unit of measure should be cases.

QUESTION \#4: Item 37 - red onions; 50 lbs for 25 lb bag bags. This seems extraordinarily low on volume for only 2 bags for the annual volume, should this be 50 bags?

Answer: No, our schools only order a small amount of red onions. Our schools currently usually order a three (3) pound bag. If needed, the Responder should list a minimum pack size.

QUESTION \#5: Item 38 - yellow onions 100lbs. For 50 lb bags, that would be only 2 bags for the annual volume, should this be 100 bags?

Answer: No, our schools only order a small amount of the medium-jumbo sized yellow onion. Our schools usually order a three (3) pound bag. If needed, the Responder should list a minimum pack size.

QUESTION \#6: Item 40 - yellow onions sliced; 100 -lb unit. The diced onions are 150 cases of 5lb bag. Should this be 100 cases of 5lb sliced bags?

Answer: Yes, this unit of measure should be cases.

QUESTION \#7: Item 57 - Strawberries. States 15,000 qty and unit of measure its pt., description states 81lb packs. Should this be cases for unit of measure or lbs? Typically, a pint is 0.75 lbs of strawberries but this would not be the normal conversion rate or unit of measure in the industry?

Answer: Yes, it should be 3,000 cases.

QUESTION \#8: Item 62. For whole watermelon, what is the minimum weight per melon, with no specification the bidder could bid on a 3 lb watermelon versus the industry norms of 12,15 or 20 lb .?

Answer: The minimum weight is ten (10) lbs.
